This includes aligning their academic programmes and research priorities to the national socio-economic aspirations as espoused in the Vision 2030 and the Big Four Agenda.

Let me also commend all those who have played their respective parts in enabling our graduands today to achieve their dreams. It took the hard work and sacrifice of many, including parents, guardians, sponsors, University staff, and partners of the University.
